Historical Village of Hokkaido

The Historical Village of Hokkaido is located in Nopporo Shinrin Park. This is an open air museum which was built to celebrate the centennial of Hokkaido.

The park opened in April 1983 and has buildings from the Meiji period to the early Showa period. The purpose of the park is to understand the life of those days and to experience it physically.

Various events are held there all year round. Carp streamers are displayed from April to May. In August, the Star Festival is held and participants can write wishes on a strip of paper and hang it on a bamboo leaf.

In December you can experience Mochitsuki. This is making rice cakes in English.

There are more than 50 buildings in the village on 54.2 hectares. There are four areas. There is a farming village, a fishing village, a mountain village and a town.

There are some houses and barns in the farming village and you can see architecture that is particular to Hokkaido.

A ship and fishing implements are displayed in the fishing village. In this way, each area has its own purpose.

There is a guided tour carried out by volunteers and they give explanations about the buildings in both Japanese and English, so tourists can enjoy it.

The opening dates and times are different each season. From May to September it is open every day from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

From October to April it's open from 9:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. However, it's closed on Mondays (except when Mondays are holidays it is closed on Tuesdays) and during the New Year (Dec. 29 – Jan. 3).

The fee for adults 15 to 64 is \pm 800. The fee is \pm 600 for university and high



school students with an ID.

Junior high students and younger, as well as persons 65 years or older, are free. Those with groups of 10 or more get a ± 100 discount per person.

Parking is free, or you can catch bus 22 from Shin-Sapporo Station. The bus costs $\frac{1}{2}$ 210 for adults and $\frac{1}{2}$ 110 for children.

Get off at the last stop, which takes about 18 minutes from the station. For more information, please check the website below.

Rakugo: The Japanese Art of Storytelling

Rakugo is a Japanese form of storytelling by one person. It is a very old tradition and has been popular for over 400 years.

Rakugo topics are amusing stories about common people's daily lives. It consists of an introduction and a main body.

At the end there is always an ochi, or punch-line. They are funny and emotional stories.

The storytellers are called Rakugoka, and they wear a kimono and are seated on a floor cushion on a stage.

The Rakugoka play the role of various characters by themselves. To perform each character skillfully, they change their voice and turn their head to the left and right.



Rakugoka make use of a folding fan and a small cloth called tenugui.

For example, the folding fan can be used as chopsticks and the tenugui can be used as a soup bowl.

In this way the audience can imagine the stories. Rakugo can be enjoyed by adults and children from all countries.


The second place team got \$50,000 prize money.

Iwamizawa Agricultural High School

About a 20 minute walk from Iwamizawa JR Station is the Iwamizawa Agricultural High School.

This high school specializes in agricultural science, basic science and technology and was designated a Super Science High School by the Ministry of Education.

The school was established in May, 1907. There are a total of 797 students and 114 of those are in the Agricultural Department.

Most of the students are males and many of them are 2nd and 3rd generation farmers.

Besides agriculture subjects, students also study English to improve conversation and presentation skills and they focus on improving comprehension and learning English expressions.

In addition, students learn how to improve their ability to compose logical sentences.



Students also learn mathematics and enhanced logical thinking skills required for science projects and presentations.

All of these areas of study are used to conduct exploratory-centered learning, observation and experimenttation.

Youth Forum News spoke to teachers Mr. Yasuyuki Ishida and Mr. Mikihiro Takeda.

Mr. Ishida transferred to Iwamizawa Agricultural High School from Bihoro High School in 2018.

He is highly respected among students. He said he wanted to become a teacher because he was inspired by the teacher in charge of his high school agricultural club.

His emphasis is on basic cultivation techniques and business knowledge and skills.

He explained that there are certain certification requirements for the production and sale of agricultural products.

Management of the production process must be carried out safely using global GAP (Good Agricultural Practices) standards in order to realize sustainable agricultural products.

The Department of Agricultural Science produces 30 to 40 kinds of vegetables, including cucumbers, eggplants, melons and watermelons.

Mr. Takeda teaches in the Department of Life Science and began teaching at the school in 2008.

He said that he decided to become a teacher when he was 30 years old.

He teaches gardening and distribution, which has a total of 112 students from freshman to senior.

In order to give students valuable hands-on experience, the school holds events which include Green Fairs, Food Fairs.

Students sell their goods in "Rock Farming Shops," which takes its name from the school.

The word "Rock" means "Iwa" in Japanese and is taken from the first part of Iwamizawa and "Farming" is for Agriculture.

The most recent Green Fair was held on May 18 and the Rock Farming Shops, where students sell their goods, were also open on June 14.

The purpose is for students to learn how to cultivate, grow and then sell flowers, vegetables and dairy products.



The most popular flowers at the Green Fair are poinsettia and cyclamen, and the bulbs are sold in winter.

Cyclamen are perennial flowering plants, of which there are 23 species.



The Food Fair will be held on Saturday, October 5 at Ario Sapporo (North 7, East 9) and five other locations around Hokkaido.

The most popular item at the Food Fair is tomatoes. Other items for sale are processed foods, including meat, milk, butter and ice cream.

Mr. Ishida and Mr. Takeda both stress that there are many points of contact with people in the distribution process.

Therefore, students must connect with people at the various stages of production, distribution, and sales by learning compassion and hospitality.

Please visit one or all of the fairs when you have the time.

It's not a long drive from Sapporo and there is plenty of parking available.

The original contract was for five years until 2016 and was extended twice.

The musical for the final performance is the famous *Little Mermaid*.

The powerful acting and the beautiful singing was overwhelming.

Even when the curtain came down the applause did not stop. It was very impressive.

The Hokkaido Gekidanshiki will remain in the hearts of fans for a lifetime.

This movie sold over 7 million tickets and grossed ¥9 trillion since its opening day.

The voice of Conan was played by Minami Takayama. She is a Japanese voice actress also known for her role as Kiki in *Kiki's Delivery Service*.

The voice of the phantom thief Kaito Kid was played by Yamaguchi Kappei. He is a Japanese voice actor known for his role as Usopp in *ONE PIECE*.

In this story, a lawyer named Sherilyn Tan was killed by someone at the small island resort hotel Marina Bay Suns in Singapore.

A police officer found the name card of Kaito Kid at the murder scene.

Other characters in the story, such as Ran, Sonoko and Kogorou, visited Singapore in order to watch a Karate competition.

Conan had planned to stay at home, but he stowed away in Kaito Kids' suitcase instead because Conan wanted to clear Kaito Kid of the murder charge.

Once in Singapore, Kaito Kid learned that the world's largest blue sapphire stone

was in a vault in a grand home, so he made a plan to steal it.

The Detective Conan serialization first started in January 1994 at Weekly Shonen Sunday, a manga magazine, and was later released in book form in July of that same year.

The animated TV show started in 1996 and the first Conan movie was released in 1997 and a new one has been released every April since then. The current film is

the 23rd installment.

The TV animated cartoon had high ratings and marked its 20th anniversary in 2016.

The total circulation of the 40-volume Conan Series exceeded 230 million copies worldwide as of November, 2018.

This movie has international intrigue, powerful action scenes and romantic situations, so everyone can enjoy this movie.
